# **Vale: Colin Williams - Art West Community Gallery** *by Di Cox and Judy Hamilton*



In 2015, Colin Williams set about creating a Community Art Gallery to cater to the needs of established and emerging artists in the western suburbs. He considered a Community Gallery as critical to the cultural health of the area as any library, field or playground is to the intellectual and physical health of the community. Printing flyers, he distributed them around the Western suburbs; canvassing expressions of interest in pursuing the Community Gallery idea. (Art West Community Gallery and Di Cox).

Colin was a gentleman and a gentle man. He was not an artist but he loved art. Again, he was not only a lover of "high" art, but he loved vernacular art - the art of the community.

Col was already an octogenarian when he began this venture and sixteen enthusiastic takers for the first meeting held in July 2015. In this sixteen was an amazing lady called Teresa Mole - an artist and an art teacher who became the first secretary of the group and in Col's fond words - "The Minister for Everything".

Through the journey, Col had the support of his wife Ann, and his friend of thirty years - Steve Norris. Col was not a spring chicken when he began this journey, but with Steve on the sidelines, he had a firm ally for the fulfillment of his dreams. Add the dynamic Teresa to the mix, and they were a formidable team.

The opening of a gallery at Mt Ommaney must have seemed like the culmination of Col's dreams. The group was offered a space in which to create a gallery by the management of Mt. Ommaney Shopping Centre. Two and a half years in the "shabby chic" of the Art West Community Gallery at Mt Ommaney were followed by another two and a half years in the "chic" gallery inside the shopping centre.

A grace and favour placement is always reliant on the whim of others, and Art West had to leave their gallery in Mt Ommaney when a paying tenant was found. Not to let the dream die, the resourceful Art West committee successfully negotiated a space at Kenmore Village. A small space, but fruitful - a case of interested buyers supporting local artists.

Kenmore Village was always a stop-gap measure but Col must have been proud when the group that he had founded voted to take the risk of taking up a commercial lease on a space at Indooroopilly Central. Art West Community Gallery had the confidence to lease this gallery space into the future.

Through years of hard work from the various Art West committees, local artists and the support of local communities, Col's dream persists. Col Williams would be proud to know that his dream of a gallery supporting Western Suburbs artists was no longer a grace and favour arrangement, but a solid commercial enterprise.

Sadly, Colin Williams, roustabout, grazier, and art lover passed away the evening before the Art West Community Gallery held its official opening at Indooroopilly Central. I hold Col in great esteem because he had a vision and when most people are slowing down, Col rolled up his sleeves and got down to work.






# Notes from BVAC Meeting, 14th December 2023

President's Report: Another busy year is drawing to a close. Member groups will be organising Christmas events and planning for 2024. The last of the Pop Up Events was held in November at the Auditorium at Mt Cootha Botanical Gardens. Thank you to Joanne from Paper Makers for the enthusiasm and commitment to trying a new way to engage the public and increase visitor numbers. Also thank you to those who participated in the event and pre and post event machinations. A reminder that a steering committee for the Open Weekend in July will be formed at the start of 2024 to look at the best way to develop this event. All ideas are welcome but member involvement is paramount. Thank you to everyone who attended and provided input at the November meeting where discussions were held around the Pop Up shops and Open Weekend. It was great to hear others' perspectives. A huge thank you to all of you who attend meetings and represent the interests of your groups. Remember recommendations and ideas are always welcome – if we keep doing the same thing all the time we can expect to get the same results. May I wish everyone on behalf of the committee a very happy holiday break and I look forward to seeing you all in 2024.

Treasurers Report: Income continues to be at an all-time high due to the full use of the building. A net profit of \$2333 in the last 12 months is a great result considering how much we've spent on improvements in 2023. Congratulations to all involved. I know it's hard work.

**Building and Maintenance:** The lift is working but the phone in the lift is a problem now being investigated by the lift repairer, Solar panels have been cleaned and all fluros in the Hub have now been replaced with LED's for better light and more efficiency. Thanks to Resilient. The hot water downstairs has been turned down. Our fire doors have passed inspection. Low water pressure is due to the old galvanised water pipes that are rusting from the inside. We have a quote for replacement of the galvanised pipes and will apply for a grant to cover this in the new year. Approximate cost \$5,000.

Website Report: Kirstin is working with Mike who has his tech team on the problems currently affecting our Website. A lot of malware has been removed from the system, and he is also setting up a two factor authentication system to help with the problem. Plug-ins need to be updated regularly. A quick check at the meeting revealed that we are still having problems with access to our own website. Actioned at the meeting was a quote for a simple server plan costing \$100 per month. Motioned by Susan that we install the server service and in 6 months review the progress and see if it suits our needs or we need to upgrade.

**Pop-up Shop Report:** Thanks to Joanna Faber (PAQ) for the theme and all her extra work, Pauline Stevens for organizing "the find a tree" activity, the raffles, and being in charge of the tablecloths -a thankless job, which is much appreciated by all who use them. Let's have volunteers from the groups to take the pressure off Pauline next time. Thank you to the Scattered Arts members for bringing the tablecloths over and to Perrin for transporting everything else. The plan for groups to return their own shelves and tablecloths to the Hub did not work well. Joanna, Pauline and Allie stepped up and brought back a majority of the things. This has shown us we need to work out a better system for transporting these things as we can't always rely on one person having a car big enough to transport the lot.



# **Notes from BVAC Meeting cont...**

Thank you to the groups who provided feedback from the Pop-Up Shop. This is helpful in showing what groups know and what they don't understand. A synopsis was emailed to everyone with the agenda. The feedback was discussed and while there were some good points raised, there were quite a few things we already do and it was felt that maybe some of the pop-up shop co-ordinators weren't passing on all the information to their participants. It was suggested that going forward a list of all member group participants emails be forwarded to the publicity co-ordinator to be sent direct emails with promotion materials such as flyers etc. Changes to the pop-up shop committee will be introduced in 2024 and this will be discussed at the meeting in February. If you intend to participate in the Pop-Ups, a representative for your group would be a good idea at this meeting. I am looking forward to seeing what 2024 brings and what the changes/improvements will bring to the overall running and visibility of the pop-up shop. And my thanks go to all participants and group co-ordinators for a successful 2023.

Possible dates for 2025 were put forward. June 13-15th 2025, with set-up 12th; November 12-14 2025, with set-up 11th; These will be sent into Mt Coot-tha for approval.

# **Art Imagined - RQAS Art Exhibition**

The **Art of Imagination** is the second show of its type that the Royal Queensland Art Society has presented. The first, two years ago, was, in my opinion, a slightly better exhibition, but there is plenty of imagination in this show. The exhibitors have let their imaginations go wild.

New Era, by Natasha Zraikat, is a rather eerie image of a young man with large ram horns growing out of his head. He looks hazily off into the distance. The image reminded me of Ron Pearlman's character in the film, *Hellboy*, although this man is not red in colour. Cees Sliedrecht's work, When the Gods Descend in the Forum, takes us back to a time in history. It is a well - balanced with composition loose brush strokes complemented by excellent drawing, which conveys the theme. It was certainly deserving of an award.

Eri Yamaguchi's Ko No Si - Spiritual Tree is a delightful image of mushrooms and other fungi doing all sorts of quirky things. It has very much a May Gibbs feeling to it. Another work mirroring May Gibbs is Aussie Bush Legend by Michelle Valdivia. A kookaburra, with a body of a lizard (part of its staple food), is about to pounce on a Carpet Snake, which also eats lizards and maybe on occasions, kookaburras. It almost looks like the evolution circle of life has gone haywire. The pen and ink medium used shows fine to heavy line work as well as washes. The use of a white paper ground also enhances the work.

The award-winning *The Goddess* by Laura McCormack shows plenty of intense line work mixed with numerous creations throughout: birds, insects, flowers, eyes and even a set of bagpipes. The more you look at it, the more images you seem to find. *The Hidden Portal* by Michael Cheshire shows a small cat entering the portal, looking almost like the swirling entry that James Darren and Robert Colbert made in the 1960's TV series *The Time Tunnel*. A black owl is perched above the portal, perhaps enticing the cat to go further into the unknown void. The work is interesting as it is all created with different wood veneers. It is quite clever.

Marcela Urquia's, *Self Destruct*, shows a woman's face emerging out of an abstract array of cool colours. The white line, used in a limited way, adds to the appeal of the image. Rod Cassidy's *Through the Looking Glass* is a grotesque version of what the Alice in Wonderland stories could be. It depicts a multitude of twisted figures: evil looking large-toothed rabbits, birds, fish and even a green frog. A face is reflected in a small mirror is maybe that of the artist. Even the surreal enters the fray in the work *Looks of Persuasion* by Laura McCallion. The figure is so brittle that she is literally falling apart like eggshells, while being watched by many sets of eyes.

For me, the most weird and bizarre work in the show was *Flights of Fancy* by Jodie-Lea Matheson. A taxidermied white rat (with wings) is being ridden a smaller rodent. It is an intriguing work as there was nothing else like it in the exhibition. Other works of interest were *Tawney Textures* by Kirsty-Ann Duffy, *Why so Blue* by Wilna Ten Cate, *I Can hear the Sea* by David Ladley, *Catch of the Day* by Christine Walker and Robbie Erskine's *Delivering Spring*. If hard edged abstraction is your thing, then you can't go past *Space Odyssey* by John Dunn.

The exhibition has a little something for everyone and is varied in compositions, media and styles. The RQAS has again produced an exhibition that veers away from the usual landscapes, still life and figurative works, that has become the mainstream of its history.
